WIDECOMBE SAILING CLUB

Hi Yvette,

Thank you for thinking of the Sailing Club as an organisation worth consulting!

I have several thoughts about a new village hall.

Firstly I'm very much in favour. This is because last year when I put on the Gigspanner Big Band I needed a venue that could house 200 in the audience and found nowhere on the moor that would do. We ended up at St Andrews Church in Ashburton. I would always prefer Widecombe events to be put on in Widecombe if possible. This means that a venue big enough for the magic 200 (seated) would be useful for more than just the WSC. Presumably other organisations would be going down the same road, looking for somewhere on the moor that big. So that's my first prerequisite.

Second prerequisite is the parking - if you're going to bring that many people to the village you need parking for lots of cars, probably more than the village has at the moment.

My third is good acoustics. I'm told by those who know that Lustleigh VH has the best acoustics in the area (although crap parking) because they were aware of that need at the planning stage.

I haven't seen the plans yet (and hope to at the meeting in a couple of weeks) but something that would be important to me - as far as possible - is the aesthetic values of the hall. Most village halls seem to be quite soulless buildings. An awful lot of performances these days are put on in old buildings - and as you know my gigs are mostly at the Cafe on the Green. The venue does make a difference to atmosphere for both performer and audience. So is there room in the plans for some way of building in character? Or is that too pie-in-the-sky?

My last point is that I do love the Church House, impractical as it is for Sailing Club events. I would hate this to be lost to the village through everyone else migrating their activities to the village hall.

IN SUMMARY:-

I think that having discussed this with Liz (my wife), we see the Village Hall as good for the community, but potentially not so good for our business. As always one always thinks of "how will this impact on me". We think that if there is a negative for us, it is the simple fact that some events, meetings and community gatherings that currently happen at the café would migrate to the village hall. Almost everyday we have people from the immediate and wider community meeting for private, business and local government meetings. While we don't at present hold that many evening events, it is probable that the village hall would be the natural location to hold events, and no doubt it (the village hall) would wish to generate income to ensure its continued success. It therefore would almost certainly require a kitchen or the ability to provide some level of catering – which could and probably would impact on our business in some way.

Taking my business hat off, then I think that the village hall would be very good for the community. But it would require considerable finance to ensure continued success and ongoing upkeep, and it would therefore need to generate income, and how it generated income is the area that putting the business hat back on is where our concerns would lie.
